Kansas offers several voluntary programs at no cost to support first time parents, those who already have children or are expecting, single mothers and fathers, families with low-income, and families experiencing disabilities or developmental delays.

Many of these programs can connect parents with a trained family-support professional helping you at times that are convenient for you in your own home or virtual online.

All programs are at no cost to parents, but some may have specific eligibility criteria.

EARLY HEAD START (EHS) PROGRAMS

EHS programs offer support for low-income families with children ages 3 or younger

HEALTHY FAMILIES AMERICA

Healthy Families America assists new parents who are overburdened by stress. The program starts during pregnancy or after the baby arrives, and continues until the child is three to five years old.

NURSE-FAMILY PARTNERSHIP

The Nurse-Family Partnership program offers support to low-income, first time mothers from pregnancy until their baby is 2 years old.

INFANT-TODDLER SERVICES

with Disabilities Education Act is a statewide program designed to enhance parent's ability to support their children ages 0 through 2 years of age that experience disabilities or developmental delays.

PARENTS AS TEACHERS (PAT)

PAT provides home support to engage parents and families expecting a child or with children under age 3 (some programs continue to kindergarten), with promoting early development, learning, and the health of their child.

TEAM FOR INFANTS EXPOSED TO SUBSTANCE USE (TIES) PROGRAM

The TIES Program provides intensive, home-based services to support pregnant and postpartum women and their families affected by maternal substance use. Women 18 years or older and their families are eligible to participate and comprehensive, individualized services are provided until the child is 2 years old.

UNIVERSAL MCH HOME VISITING

MCH Home Visiting is available for pregnant women and families with infants up to 1 year. The MCH Home Visiting program concentrates on the inherent strengths of individuals, families, groups, and organizations and includes an initial assessment, a prenatal visit, and a postpartum home visit.

ATTACHMENT AND BIOBEHAVIORAL CATCH-UP (ABC)

ABC helps parents engage in positive parent-child interaction. ABC supports parents environment. This helps to enhance a child's ability to monitor and balance their emotions. ABC offers two programs: one for infants and one for toddlers.
